



Conservation District Awarded Grant

The Tehama County Resource Conservation District was awarded two grants worth more than \$65,000 through the Sierra Nevada Conservancy for "Healthy Forest" projects.

A \$23,550 grant is for the Tramway Road/A-Line Road Shaded Fuel environmental analysis, and the other, in the amount of \$41,663, is to fund the Childs Meadow Head Cut Repair Project.

The conservancy board approved \$2.2 million in "Healthy Forest" grants for 24 projects designed to reduce the risk of forest fires and protect the state's watersheds in 14 counties.

"Returning our forests to ecological health reduces the threat of fire, protecting our wildlife, our water and our lives," Sierra Nevada Conservancy Executive Officer Jim Branham said in a statement. "These projects will help us achieve these goals, while providing jobs and helping to sustain local Sierra economies."

Butte County was awarded a \$100,000 grant and Shasta County a \$75,000 grant. The grants are funded by Proposition 84, the Safe Drinking Water Act of 2006.

Projects typically funded by the conservancy grant program include fuel reduction, forest and meadow restoration, and invasive plant species removal.

Branham said that because of decades of fire suppression and conflict over forest management, today's major forest fires can have a devastating impact on the landscape and on the watershed resulting in erosion and siltation pollution of rivers, lakes and reservoirs.

Created in 2004, the Sierra Nevada Conservancy is a state agency that has awarded \$45 million for conservancy projects in the past four years.

\$180,000 In Healthy Forest Grants

Mariposa, CA -- Calaveras and Tuolumne counties will receive \$182,866 for three projects from the Sierra Nevada Conservancy. Approved by the Sierra Nevada Conservancy's (SNC) Governing Board the over \$2.1 million in "Healthy Forest" grants is for 24 projects in 14 Sierra counties. The projects (listed below) are designed to reduce the risk of forest fires and protect California's watersheds.

The grants are funded by Proposition 84, the Safe Drinking Water Act passed by voters in 2006.

"Returning our forests to ecological health reduces the threat of fire, protecting our wildlife, our water and our lives," said SNC Executive Officer Jim Branham. "These projects will help us achieve these goals, while providing jobs and helping to sustain local Sierra economies."

The types of projects typically funded under the SNC's grant program include fuels reduction (removal of underbrush and thinning of some smaller diameter trees), forest and meadow restoration, and invasive plant species removal. Many of the projects will be operational in the fall.

Under Prop 84 guidelines, funds may be awarded to government agencies, non-profit organizations, or federally recognized tribes. Projects may be on public or private land, but the outcome must serve to protect the watershed and provide public benefit.

"Because of decades of fire suppression and conflict over forest management, today's major forest fires can have a devastating impact on the landscape and on the watershed," Branham said. "The resulting erosion and siltation pollute our rivers, lakes, and reservoirs. By spending our precious dollars up in the Sierra proactively, we can reduce the risk and consequence of these fires, protecting the source of two-thirds of California's drinking water."

The Sierra Nevada Conservancy, Governing Board was created in 2004 with the mission to improve the environmental, economic, and social well-being of the Sierra Nevada Region. The SNC receives no general fund tax dollars.

County Receives Three Health Forest Grants

The Sierra Nevada Conservancy's (SNC) Governing Board today approved \$2.2 million in "Healthy Forest" grants for 24 projects designed to reduce the risk of forest fires and protect California's watersheds in 14 Sierra counties, including three for Tulare County. With Thursday's award, the SNC has now awarded \$45 million for similar projects in the Sierra in the past four years, including \$7 million this year.

The grants are funded by Proposition 84, the Safe Drinking Water Act passed by voters in 2006.

Tulare County's three grants totalled \$662,138. The largest of the 24 grants \$350,000 went to the Tulare County Resource Conservation District and Sequoia Fire Safe Council for a fuel load reduction project at Mountain Home Demonstration State Forest.

The Sequoia National Forest was awarded two grants — \$237,000 for to control velvetgrass (*Holcus lanatus*) in the Kern Canyon of Sequoia National Park and Sequoia National Forest and \$74,500 to create restoration plan for Cahoon Meadow in the Sequoia National Park.
